BY-LAWS OF THE EASTERN MICHIGAN FAIR

LAPEER COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY - Imlay City, Michigan *Adopted at the Annual Meeting October 10, 1963*

The name of this Society shall be "The Lapeer County Agricultural Society," Imlay City, Michigan, sponsors of the Eastern Michigan Fair, an Educational, Agricultural and Industrial Exposition, organized under the laws of the State of Michigan.

SECTION I – BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

This Society shall have nine (9) Directors who shall constitute a Board of Management of the Society.

SECTION II – TERMS OF OFFICE

At the annual meeting of the Society there shall be elected from the membership three (3) Directors for a term of (3) years and three (3) Directors each year thereafter for the same term. The term of office of all Directors shall commence on the first day of November, except the Directors first elected shall take office immediately.

SECTION III – ELECTION OF DIRECTORS

The Directors shall be elected by secret ballot at the annual meeting of the Society. Only one nomination will be allowed each member and there must be at least two nominations for each position to be filled.

SECTION IV – ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of the Society shall be held in Imlay City on the 3rd Wednesday of October at 7:00 PM. Special meetings may be called by the President at any time and shall be called by him upon written request of five (5) members of the Society. Notice of such special meeting shall be published in a newspaper, printed, published, and circulating in the County of Lapeer at least once and at least five days before the date of said meeting. Such special meeting shall transact only such business as is specified in the notice thereof.

SECTION V – QUORUM

- (a) Quorum of Members. A quorum shall be defined as those members in attendance at a regularly scheduled meeting providing notice of said meeting is given 30 days prior to the meeting. This definition shall apply to the annual meeting and special meetings of the Society.
- (b) Quorum of Directors. A majority of the directors shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION VI – DUTIES OF BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

- (a) The Board of Management shall control and regulate all the affairs of the society, make or authorize to be made all necessary contracts, purchases and expenditures, engage, direct and discharge employees and servants, including a Manager to whom they may delegate authority and duties, enforce all Bylaws and Rules, and shall have such other and further powers as are usually inherent to a Board of Management and as may be provided for in the Bylaws and Articles of Incorporation.
- (b) The Board of Management shall have full control of all fairs and exhibitors, and the determination of the scope or extent thereof. The awarding of premiums, the making of suitable rules and regulations, the appointments of department superintendents, and all committees and subagents for the proper and efficient conduct thereof. The said Board of Management shall have the power to determine where the place of various exhibits or demonstration, or entered by premiums, or in contest, or as concessions or amusement, and may enlarge, change, or diminish the space allotted any person or persons at any time as it may deem proper advisable.

The Board of Management shall hold regular monthly meetings. At the regular meeting in November the Board of Management shall elect from their own number a President, a Vice President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer. The term of such offices shall be for one (1) year or until their successors are elected and qualified.

- (a) Special meetings of the Board of Management may be called by the President at any time and shall be called by him upon the written request of two or more members thereof.
- (b) The Board of Management shall have power to adopt such rules for the conduct of the Society and its members as it may from time to time deem necessary, provided such rules are not inconsistent with these Bylaws.
- (c) In the event that a vacancy shall occur on the Board of Management or among its elected officers, or in the event that any member of the board or officer shall, illness, incapacitation, miss three (3) consecutive meetings, or other causes become unable or unwilling to discharge the duties of the office to which he was elected or appointed, then the Board of Directors may declare such office or position vacant and proceed to fill such vacancy by appointment, and the officer or member so appointed shall hold the office until the next succeeding election. Power, authority of duties of such appointee may, however, be limited, restricted or terminated by the Board of Management at any time while such person is serving under appointment.

SECTION VII – DUTIES OF OFFICERS

- (a) The President shall preside at all meetings of the Society and all meetings of the Board of Management shall perform all other duties usually incident to the Board of Management from time to time.
- (b) The Vice-President shall perform the duties of the President in the absence or disability of the President.
- (c) The Secretary shall keep a record of all meetings of the Society and meetings of the Board of Management and shall duly account for and pay to the Treasurer all money which may at any time come into his hands belonging to said Society and shall perform all duties customarily incident to the office of the Secretary and such other duties as the Board of Management may assign from time to time.
- (d) The Treasurer shall be charged with the collection and custody of the funds and with their disbursement under the direction of the Board of Management. He shall make a report at every regular meeting showing his receipts and disbursements to the Management. His accounts shall be audited annually and shall be open to the examination of the President and the Board of Management.
- (e) The Manager shall perform all duties customarily incident to the office of the Manager and such other duties as the Board of Management may assign from time to time and shall duly account for and pay to the Treasurer all money which may at any time come into his hands belonging to said Society and shall make a report at every regular meeting.

SECTION VIII – PUBLICATION, BYLAWS AND RULES

A copy of these Bylaws and all rules and regulations made and adopted by the Board of Management for the control and conduct of the annual fair and exhibition shall be published in the annual premium list and catalog of the Society.

SECTION IX – MEMBERSHIP

- (a) Lapeer County Agricultural Society Memberships will be available for purchase until 12:00 Noon the second day of the fair. The price of a \$25.00 membership fee will entitle members to vote at the Annual Meeting of that year (and shall entitle the member to vote at all meetings of the Society during their membership). Members must be 18 years of age or older.
- (b) All applications shall be turned over by the Secretary to the Board of Management at the first meeting of said Board succeeding receipt of the application, will be added to the membership of the Society.
- (c) Except for the first meeting of members of the Society following the adopting of these Bylaws, members to be eligible to election to the Board of Management must have been members in good standing for a period of not less than two (2) successive years prior to said election date.
- (d) There shall be obtained, at least ninety (90) days prior to the first annual meeting after the adoption of these Bylaws, a minimum of 50 members and the membership shall be maintained at no less than 50 members, if, initially, 50 members shall not be obtained, or if at any time the membership shall become less than 50, the Society will be operated under Act 80 of 1855.

SECTION X – EXPULSION

- (a) Whenever the conduct or character of any member shall injure, or be likely to injure the welfare, interest or character of the Society he may be expelled there from.
- (b) The Board of Management of its own motion may, upon the complaint in writing of three (3) members, enter a resolution upon its records for the Investigation of charges against any member which shall specify the charges and fix a time and place for hearing of the same.
- (c) Elected officers and any member of the Board of Management may be removed from office for cause by the affirmative vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the members present in person at any regular or special meeting of the Society, notice of the proposed action having been mailed to all members and to the affected officer or member of the Board of Management twenty (20) days previous to the meeting, which notice to the affected officer or member of the Board of Management shall contain a statement of the cause of removal to be determined at said meeting. Voting on the question of removal shall be by secret written ballot. Should such office be declared vacant, it shall be filled by the Board of Management at its first regular or special meeting thereafter, and the person appointed shall serve until the successor is elected and qualified. Employees and servants hired by the Board of Management shall not be within the scope of this section (c).

SECTION XI – CONTRACTS

Except as otherwise specified by the Board of Management, all contracts relating to the business of the Society shall be executed in behalf of the Society by the President and Secretary, provided in the event of the absence or disability of the President or Secretary, the Board of Management may authorize the execution of specific contracts by any officer of the Society in the place and stead of the absent or disabled officer.

Rules Governing Entries, Exhibits and Awards

SECTION 1 – GENERAL

1. The Fair Management reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and to arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions, and differences in regard thereto. It further reserves the right to amend or add to these rules.
2. Disregard of any rules may result in rights and privileges being forfeited without recourse.
3. The management will use diligence to ensure the safety of livestock and articles entered for exhibition or display after their arrival on the grounds but under no circumstances will they be responsible for loss, injury or damage by fire, lightning, wind or by any other agency, to such livestock, or article on exhibition or display and the Fair and management thereof shall be held harmless by the exhibitors against all legal or other proceedings relating thereto.
4. Exhibitors must place all exhibits under the direction of the Fair Management.
5. Exhibitors will be permitted to bring into the grounds only a limited amount of feed, hay or baled straw, and the management reserves the right to refuse admission of such, if in their judgment there is an excessive amount. The pace in the barns and tents is for exhibition purposes and not for storage of feed.
6. In the event of conflict between the general rules and the special rules governing the various departments, the general rules will take precedence.
7. The Fair Management reserves the right to make all final decisions regarding eligibility of all entries registered to participate in the Eastern Michigan State Fair.
8. Unless otherwise specified, Championship Classes, Best of Show Classes and Sweepstakes Classes will consist of ONLY the 1st place of the stated eligible classes.
9. Feed may be delivered between 6:00 - 9:00 am using the Van Dyke Gate. Vehicles must leave this area by 9:00 am.
10. All pen and/or stall sheets are due at time of registration.

SECTION 2 – ENTRIES

1. Application for entries in all departments must be made on official Eastern Michigan State Fair entry forms. The right is deserved to reject any entry offered.
2. All entries must be made in the name of the bona fide owner. Each exhibitor will be required to present certificate of registration for entries when called upon to do so by the Superintendent in charge of each Department.
3. All exhibitors are requested not to invite or permit judges to examine their animals in stalls or pens before they enter the showing.
4. Misrepresentations as to breeding or ownership of animals and irregularity or violation of rules in showing may result in loss of standing and/or being barred from exhibiting at the Eastern Michigan State Fair for a period of 1year.
5. Entries are to be made only in items listed in the Fair Book.
6. When all stalls are filled, the Fair Management may close further entries in said classes.
7. No wristbands will be issued until the animal or project has been brought in for display.
8. The same article or animal may NOT be entered in more than one class within a section except for Championship Classes, Best of Show Classes, Sweepstakes Classes, Horse Divisions where specified, Get of Sire Classes, Produce of Dam Classes, Dam and Daughter Classes, Herd Classes, Flock Classes, Pen Classes, Pair Classes, showmanship Classes, and Dairy Goats-Does in Milk Classes.
9. All produce exhibited must be grown by the exhibitor in the State of Michigan. All articles entered must have been made by the exhibitor making the entry. All livestock must be owned by the exhibitor at least two months before making entry unless otherwise specified.

Age brackets are as follows (Age is determined on January 1st the year of fair):

- Sprout - 5 - 7 years of age
- Junior - 8 - 10 years of age
- Intermediate – 11 - 13 years of age
- Senior – 14 - 16 years of age
- Advanced Senior – 17 - 19 years of age

Any person enrolled in a secondary school the same calendar year as fair is eligible to participate.

Registration Dates and Times

1. Eastern Michigan State Fairgrounds office will be open for registration on: June 1st and close registration June 30th at 5 pm.
2. Registrations sent by mail will be accepted provided they are postmarked by last Saturday in June.
3. Late entries will be accepted until July 24th. An additional late processing fee of \$50.00 per individual must be paid along with the entry fees.
4. Any admission or privilege passes issued by the fair management are subject to verification by fair personnel at any time and must be verified with picture identification. Any exhibitor abusing their privilege, such as allowing someone else free entrance with their pass, both parties will be escorted off the fairgrounds and the pass retained.
5. Once the entry has been accepted by the Fair Management, on the specified entry dates, it may not be changed for any reason.

SECTION 3 – FEES & CAMPING

Exhibitor Fee is \$10.00. All checks must be payable to: EASTERN MICHIGAN STATE FAIR

1. Trailer or Camper Rent – A camping application must be filled out at the time of registration. Payment **MUST BE MADE AT THE TIME OF ARRIVAL** to reserve a space for the duration of the Fair or any part thereof. Registration is due by last Saturday in June. **Primitive campsites only. No electricity or water hook-ups.**
2. Camping fee for trailers 28 ft and under - \$150.00; 28 ft to 40 ft - \$200.00; 41 ft and over - \$250.00
3. Camping fee includes one adult week pass and two campground parking passes.
4. Vehicles parked in campgrounds or camping parking lot without a campground parking pass will be towed.
5. Campers must show a valid fair pass (i.e., wristband, week-pass, or handstamp) with ID to enter fair.
6. Only registered campers or fair participants authorized by fair management may enter campgrounds.
7. No camping permits will be issued after lots are filled.
8. No one will take up more space than allowed for each lot.
9. If there are minors residing on a campsite, there must be at least one parent or legal guardian in attendance on the campsite.
10. No open fires or charcoal fires will be allowed in the camping area.
11. Curfew, all children, and registered participants in the fair must be at their campsite by 12:00 midnight unless accompanied by a parent.
12. Please keep your area clean from litter.
13. A dump station for waste is available at the conclusion of the fair.
14. The Campground Director oversees lot assignments.
15. No vehicle parking in camping area.
16. Campers will be accepted: Friday, per-fair, 11:00 am until 5:00 pm. Saturday, per-fair, 9:00 am until 1:00 pm
17. Campers will report to the Campground Director for placing.
18. No Dogs permits in campground area or on fairground.
19. Generators must be turned off at midnight.
20. Registered campers only after 11:00 pm.

SECTION 4 – JUDGES

1. Judges will be chosen by the area superintendents.
2. All animals must be shown in competition in the show ring when called for. If exhibitor and animal do not appear within two minutes of being called for, all placings will be forfeited.

SECTION 5 - AWARDS

1. The award of placings will be designated as follows:
 - a. First - Blue
 - b. Second - Red
 - c. Third - White
 - d. Fourth - Pink
 - e. Fifth - Yellow
 - f. Sixth – Green
2. No monetary premiums will be paid on entries to the Eastern Michigan State Fair.

SECTION 6 – PROTESTS & APPEALS

1. Appeals and Complaints: An exhibitor compelled to bring a complaint regarding conflict of interest of the judge, disqualification of an exhibit or exhibitor, group leader or superintendent's behavior, or eligibility of an exhibit, exhibitor shall in the order listed below.
 - Discuss the issue with the area Superintendent.
 - Discuss the issue with the area General Superintendent.
 - Submit the complaint in writing to the Fair Office.
2. If a resolution is not reached, protests shall be referred to the Fair Board, which shall review the protest at the next scheduled Fair Board meeting with interested parties and give parties an opportunity to submit evidence. The party against whom the protest was filed shall have the right to read the statement of protest.
3. The Fair Board shall issue an opinion within 2 weeks of the fore mentioned scheduled meeting.
4. An exhibitor may file appeal to the Department of Agriculture within 45 days of filing the initial complaint if the exhibitor is not satisfied with the Association's action. The Department of Agriculture shall have 60 days after receipt of any appropriately filed appeal to investigate the complaint and issue a finding of fact and notice of department action and any recommended actions for the Association.

SECTION 7 – BRINGING IN OF EXHIBITS

1. All Skill Exhibits will be brought to the fairgrounds on Saturday, minimum of 3 projects per person. Sunday 10 am - 1 pm. After they are judged they must remain here. They will be displayed for the public to see.
2. Livestock Exhibits to be brought in Sunday Pre-Fair:
 - Swine, 7 – 9 am
 - Poultry, 9 am - 1 pm
 - Goats, 10 am – 6 pm
 - Rabbits, 12:00 - 4 pm
 - Dairy Heifers, 12 – 5 pm
 - Sheep, 12 – 5 pm
 - Beef, 3 - 5 pmMonday Pre-Fair:
 - Sheep, 8 am – 12 pm
 - Dairy Cows, 7 pm - 9 pm
3. All exhibits including animals MUST remain on display for the duration of the Fair unless approved by the Manager. If an exhibit is removed before the specified time, may result in loss of standing and/or being barred from exhibiting at the Eastern Michigan State Fair for a period of 1 year.
4. Entry tags or stickers MUST be attached to each exhibit. Said tag or sticker MUST contain the Exhibitor's Number.
5. NOTICE: record books must be turned in when you bring your animal on Sunday or Monday depending on when they are weighed in. Record book should be completed before you bring it to fair, except for minor additions of animal weights.

SECTION 8 – RELEASE OF EXHIBITS

1. No animals will be released before 6 am Sunday. Animals will be released Sunday, immediately following fair, beginning at 6 am unless the Fair Manager approves the change.
2. Market animals will be released at 6:00 am on Sunday, post fair. See general livestock rules or animal species for specific rules.
3. All animals must be removed by noon or will be considered abandoned and will become property of the Eastern Michigan State Fair.
4. All skill exhibits will be released beginning at 9 am until 11 am, Sunday, immediately following fair only.
 - The Management will not be responsible for any properties or exhibits not removed by the time stated.
5. Any article not removed will be considered abandoned and will be disposed of by Management.

SECTION 9 – LIVESTOCK INSPECTION

1. The Board of Management reserves the right to refuse admission to any animal or animals originating from a herd whenever the status of health of the herd is questionable or suspicious.
2. Health requirements for Livestock Exhibits are set up by the State Department of Agriculture and will be strictly enforced. See Michigan Department of Agriculture Requirements for Livestock Exhibited in Michigan.
3. The Eastern Michigan State Fair will not drug test livestock entered into the Eastern Michigan State Fair.
4. All horses brought onto the Fairgrounds must have current negative Coggins certificate.
5. All animals will have USDA required tags including: Beef – RFID tags, Sheep & Goats – Scrapie tags, Swine – USDA 840 tags
6. The Fair General Livestock Superintendent or his representative will inspect all animals according to the Michigan Department of Agriculture's Current Health Requirements for Livestock Exhibited in Michigan, before they are unloaded from trailers, trucks, or cars.
7. Fair Management has the sole and exclusive right to request any exhibit, animal or otherwise to be removed from Eastern Michigan State Fairgrounds and denied ability to exhibit.

SECTION 10 – ADMISSIONS

1. Exhibitor's Ticket: See Section 3, Rules 1 & 2.

All exhibitors will be issued a wristband, which MUST be attached properly to the wrist to insure admission to the fairgrounds during the Fair. Replacement of wristbands after initial issue due to loss, damage, or any other reason will incur a charge of \$10.00 per wristband with proof of registration of entries and return of damaged wristband. This wristband is your privilege for participating in the Fair. Any exhibitor abusing their privilege, such as allowing someone else free entrance with their wristband will be escorted off the fairgrounds and the wristband will be retained.

2. The gates of the Fair will open Tuesday through Saturday fair week, at 8 am and close at 12 am, midnight, at which time all persons not connected with the Fair will be required to leave the grounds.
3. All delivery trucks furnishing supplies to concession stands must make deliveries prior to 10 am.
4. Any person who shall wrongfully or maliciously gain admission to the fairgrounds, contrary to the rules, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be subject to a fine of not less than One or More than Twenty-five Dollars.

SECTION 11 – REFUND POLICY

1. It is established that anyone may fill out a refund form giving all proper identification and complete reason of refund request. Fair Management will receive all requests and their decisions will be final.
2. Refunds are not made when fault is on the exhibitor or public, i.e.: Forgot your tickets or vehicle broke down.
3. Refund(s) are not made if there is a cancellation or delay of any event of any kind due to inclement weather or any occurrence beyond our control.

SECTION 12 – HOURS

1. Exhibit buildings will be open: Tuesday thru Saturday of fair: 12 – 9 pm.
2. For Fair Office hours, please call (810) 724-4145.
3. Merchant buildings will be open to exhibitors ½ hour before starting times.

SECTION 13 – GENERAL LIVESTOCK RULES

1. Animals are to be weighed according to the posted schedule.
2. Animals are to be tagged upon weighing at the fairgrounds. All tags not required by Eastern Michigan State Fair must be removed before weigh in.
3. All animals entered will be placed by the judge and sold at the livestock auction in the order created by animal area superintendent.
4. All animals must meet the requirements stated in Rules for Livestock Departments C-J, unless they fall under rule 1.
5. Exhibitors are required to provide care (feed, water, cleaning of stalls) for their animals each day while at the fair. Exhibitors not fulfilling this requirement will be fined twenty dollars (\$20.00) per day for each day the requirement is not met. Fine will be deducted from auction checks.
6. All Grand and Reserve Champion market animals must be sold. If a member has 2 animals, which receive Grand or Reserve Champion, both must be sold at auction.
7. Exhibitors showing any market animal must show in the corresponding showmanship class. Exceptions at discretion of superintendent.
8. On weigh-in day, show day, auction day and release day, exhibitor or their representative must be present.
9. Market animals will be released at 6:00 am on Sunday, post fair. See animal species for specific rules.
10. Grand and Reserve Champion Market Animals will be on display in their designated "Champion Area" (pen, cage, stalls, etc.) within two hours of their show and daily thereafter by 10:30 am and removed from pens between 10-10:30 pm every night of fair.
11. Each exhibitor of champion/reserve animals will be responsible for daily cleaning of their own pen or pens and around the area in the champion barn. Failure to comply will result in a \$20.00 fine will be assessed by the auction superintendent. Fines must be paid to fair office prior to auction check being distributed.

SECTION 14 – LIVESTOCK SALE (Thursday of Fair, 1 pm)

1. Livestock Sale is open to all youth between the ages of 8 – 19 including Junior, Intermediate, Senior, and Advanced Senior Showman. FFA members must meet Lapeer County FFA requirements and have approved SAE on file with FFA advisor. This rule supersedes all conflicting livestock sale rules.
2. Each exhibitor may sell 2 large animals of 2 separate species-beef, lamb, hog-with the following exception:
 - a. An exhibitor has Champion or Reserve Champion Pairs in any species.
3. Exhibitors showing in multiple large animal market classes must inform the superintendents by 8:00 pm Monday, as to which animal they prefer to sell at auction. Rules governing sale of champions may override exhibitor's choice.
4. The order of sale will rotate one position downward every year. Small animals rotate as a group.
5. All animals entered in livestock sale must be sold.
6. Animals must be cleaned and presentable at time of sale.
7. Exhibitors must be with their animal at the time of sale or animal will not sell in auction, unless previously excused by the area superintendent. Fines must be paid to fair office prior to auction check being distributed.

BEEF / MARKET ANIMALS

1. All market animals entered into the Fair must have been weighed and identified on the first Saturday of February (inclement weather date to be 3rd Saturday of February you may have up to 5 animals identified if desired).
2. All cattle must have an RFID tag in their ear before coming on the fairgrounds.
3. Pen sheets are required for any animal coming to fair.
4. All beef cattle should arrive between 3:00 pm and 5:00 pm on Sunday, pre-fair. All Feeders and Market Animals will be weighed upon arrival. Animals must be on fairgrounds and in line to weigh before 4:30 pm on Sunday before fair.
5. No animals, including any market ready animals may be taken off Fair grounds without permission from Fair Manager.
6. All market animals must be dehorned. Horn stumps must not be over 2 inches in length from the clipped hairline.
7. You may show two (2) market steers at fair, if space is available, but may sell only one unless they are both Grand and Reserve Champions.
8. All animals will be exhibited in their proper weight class. If the animal is below a weight of 900 lbs. it may not exhibit in a market class or sell.
9. Homegrown will be determined by the following: Youth member must own and care for the dam at the time of calving. If the calf is an embryo calf, the member must own and care for the recipient cow at the time of calving. Homegrown must be declared at February weigh-in to be able to show at fair.
10. Fitting Rules will be as follows: (these will override Rules for Livestock)
 - a. You MUST be with the animal the entire time the animal is being fit.
 - b. There will be no adding of hemp or hair.
 - c. There will be no paint above the navel.
 - d. There will be no artificial fill.
 - e. All fitting, clipping etc. of cattle will be done in the beef area only. Example: Fenced in area north of the barn, fenced in area east of barn, beef wash rack area or in the Walker Barn.
11. Morning chores must be done by 9:00 am, which includes pens cleaned, cattle fed and watered, presentable and in pens by 9:00 am. Evening chores must be done by 8:00 pm, which includes feeding and watering. If hot, offer more water throughout the day. No animals in tie out area after 8 pm. Wash rack closes at 10 pm.
12. All cattle must be fed and watered twice daily outside of the barn the entire week of fair.
13. You must be able to demonstrate the ability to properly tie slip knot before being able to weigh in steer.
14. All cattle must have a necktie on during the fair and properly tied with a slip knot.
15. In the event of death to a beef project animal between weigh-in and June 15th, participants member may replace project animal with a sibling's back-up animal. If no back-up animal was weighed in for that family, the participant may purchase another beef member's back-up animal that was tagged and weighed in. The market beef superintendent must be notified and approve backup animal purchase as well as be allowed to view animal to confirm death.
16. Members who have a heifer calf may show in either breeding stock section or feeder section, not both sections with same animal.
17. Only grand and reserve beef animals must sell. Participants have the option of putting a "no sale" on their animal and must let superintendents know by 6:00 pm Sunday pre-fair if they are not selling their animal.
18. All animals must have halters that will ship with them.
19. All breeding stock, feeder, and dairy animals will be released at 6:00 am and out of the barn by 9 am. Members must obtain superintendent's permission to release their animal.
20. Failure to comply with any of the rules, or lack of care of a participant's animal, may result in, removal of the exhibit and forfeiture of sale privileges and/or loss of exhibiting privileges for not more than 2 years at the Eastern Michigan State Fair.
21. Sunday morning, clean out area, help power wash barn starting at 7 am.

FEEDER MARKET BEEF

1. All feeders must be born after October 1st of the previous year.
2. Weight ranges for Feeders will be enforced as 300 - 750 lbs. If feeder is above or below weight, the member may show in feeder showmanship but not in feeder market class.
3. Each member may show 2 feeders.
4. Feeders will be weighed upon arrival on Sunday, pre-fair, between 3:00 pm and 5:00 pm.
5. All feeder beef must be castrated, dehorned and healed prior to fair. Horn stumps must not be over 2 inches from the clipped hairline.

7. Feeder ownership deadline is June 1st of the current year. Proof of ownership may be required at fair weigh-in.

1. Existing club members must be registered with the EMSF by the appropriate deadline.
2. Dogs must be healthy and free from disease. A photocopy of the rabies certificate for each dog exhibited must be attached to the Record Book. An additional copy of all rabies certificates must be provided to be filed with the Overall Livestock Superintendent.
3. Members must be responsible for at least 50% of the dog's training in the area of which they show.
4. A maximum of 4 dogs per member will be allowed, as long as the exhibitor has trained all the animals.
5. More than one dog may be shown by an exhibitor in each section, but only the highest scoring dog per each section will be eligible for placing. Sprouts may show another exhibitor's dog.
6. An exhibitor must notify the Superintendent at check in, if your female is in season.
7. Members and parents will be responsible for the care and clean-up of their dog(s). Each member must provide the proper equipment.
8. Dogs are to be crated and/or leashed when not being shown.
9. No shock collars, pinch collars, or chain leads will be allowed in the showring.
10. Anyone severely disciplining, abusing, or neglecting their dogs will be immediately dismissed from the show by the Superintendent(s).
11. A Superintendent's meeting will be called in the event of aggressive behavior to determine the eligibility of the dog to continue to show that day. Any dog that bites at an EMSF function will be dismissed. Further participation in EMSF by the dog will be decided by the Superintendents.
12. Any dog that the Superintendent(s) deem unsafe will be unable to exhibit at Fair.
13. A single exhibitor is eligible for only one high point award per area even though he/she shows multiple dogs per area. For example, a single exhibitor may win only one high point in each of the 5 divisions of Obedience, Rally, Showmanship, Jumps and Tunnels Agility, and Standard Agility. If an exhibitor showed multiple dogs in a division, the highest scoring dog receives the highpoint.
14. Exhibitors with multiple years of experience in the dog project area are strongly encouraged to compete in off-leash divisions as much as possible.

Division 1 – DOG OBEDIENCE

Dress Code: Girls and Boys should wear dress slacks or dress shorts of fingertip length or longer with the appropriate shirt/blouse. Shoes must be flat with rubber or non-skid soles. Any clothing that draws undue attention to one's self or clothing that may distract other handlers, or the judge is unacceptable. Clothing with club name and/or personal identification will not be allowed.

Dog's Equipment: must have a buckle collar without any tags. Beginner entries to use a six-foot leash. No chain leads or collars allowed. No treats, toys or training aids are allowed in the ring.

1. All Classes: A – Handler/Dog first year competition at this level B – Experienced Handler/Dog, member or dog has received other instruction or competed at this level in previous years
2. Any dog receiving three qualifying scores must move up to the next level within six months. A qualifying score is a total of 85 or more points. All exhibitors are eligible for class placements, 1st-6th place. A qualifying score (85 Points and a minimum of 50% of each exercise) is required for eligibility for Grand and Reserve Highest Scoring Dog in Show.
3. The superintendents, as entry warrants, can divide classes into age groups. An exhibitor may show multiple entries per each Agility class, however only the highest scoring dog in each class may earn a placing.

1. Breeding stock must be owned by May 31. All other goats: tag number, tattoos, or other form of permanent I.D. must be turned in at the time of fair sign-up in order to show that animal. All goats are required to have a scrapies tag.
2. Each youth exhibitor will be permitted to enter a maximum of 10 goats. A maximum of three per class except market animals.
3. OWNERSHIP-Breed Class animals must be registered in the exhibitor's name or immediate family, i.e.: sibling or parents. Registration must not be in transfer!
4. Any tattooed animal must have registration papers turned in to superintendents upon arrival, to be returned Saturday evening following Walker Barn closing ceremonies.
5. **NO BUCKS** will be allowed.
6. Pre-show milk-out Tuesday of fair from 6:00 -10:00 pm.
7. All Goats (except fiber goats, market goats and meat doe breeding stock) must be dehorned. Spur growth not in excess of 2 inches with or without horns. Superintendents or their delegates will inspect all animals before unloading.
8. Record books are encouraged to show or sell goats at fair. Books will be turned into Superintendent Monday by 5:00 pm at fair. Record books must be completed and signed by participant.
9. Participants must accompany their animals in Auction Ring unless previously excused.
10. All participants showing any market animal must show in the corresponding showmanship class. Exceptions at discretion of the superintendents.
11. Morning chores will be completed prior to 10:00 am and feed pans on floor removed. Chores the day of show must be done before 9 am and all pens will be completely cleaned of all bedding on Thursday by 10:00 am.
12. Proper show clothes will be worn in the show ring: white shirt, white pants for dairy; white shirt, black pants for pygmy, meat breeds and angora.
13. Superintendents reserve right to combine classes if a minimum number of animals is not met per breed.
14. The exhibitors of the overall junior dairy goat and the overall senior dairy goat can sell a cooler of dairy goat products in the livestock auction. There is a maximum of one cooler sold per year per exhibitor. If the same exhibitor won both classes, the reserve champion from one class may sell. HORSE

RULES Showing of Horses:

1. All exhibitors, parents, other family members, and trainers must comply with all rules that apply: General Fair Rules and Horse Department Rules.
2. The Superintendent and/or Fairboard reserve the right to combine or split any classes and/or age groups dependent on number of entries.
3. All fair related horse activities are subject to the Michigan Equine Liability Act (1994 P.A. 351).
4. All animals must be under the control of the exhibitor and the exhibitor must show awareness of correct procedures to show the animal. In the interest of safety, the Fairboard and/or Superintendent in charge shall have any animal removed which is not safely controllable by the exhibitor. At no time during the Fair, shall any animal be maintained on tranquilizers.
5. Any equine with clinical signs of infection, contagious or toxicological disease, or not in desirable body condition shall be removed from the Fair. This shall be determined by the Horse Area Superintendent, Fair Superintendent, and/or Fairboard.
6. Exhibitors are responsible to care for and prepare his/her exhibit for show.
7. An exhibitor may enter and show two horses, stalls permitting. If you plan to bring more than one horse, fill out and submit a stall sheet for each horse. If space cannot be accommodated for two horses, you will be notified two weeks prior to fair.
8. More than one member of a family may enter and show the same horse/pony, but not in the same class. All class entries should consider the welfare of the horse regardless of the number of classes. Horse conditioning and intensity of selected classes must be considered. In the event of a shared horse, the Superintendent and/or Fairboard reserve the right to make class adjustments in the best interest of the horse.
9. Once you show in the open division, you are no longer eligible for Novice Walk-Trot Rider Classes.
10. No stallions are permitted on the grounds.
11. Costume Class: all materials and other parts of the costume must be safely attached so as not to fall and cause danger to themselves or other exhibitors. Use of a helmet is encouraged and will not be penalized. Costume class will be judged at a walk.
12. Bareback classes will be judged at a walk, trot, and canter except for Novice Walk-Trot 8 - 19.

13. **Tack Changes:** If a tack change is required, the request must be submitted three classes prior. Tack changes are available to exhibitors showing in other areas at fair or when family members have back-to-back classes. A tack change lasts for up to 10 minutes and if the exhibitor has not arrived after 10 minutes, the gate closes, and the class will begin.
14. No lunging or riding in any areas except riding arena.
15. No loose horses turned out in arena at any time.
16. During the show, exhibitors must be ready to enter the arena at final call or the gate will be closed, and the exhibitor will not be allowed to enter the class.
17. If you show in Speed Type Performance Classes, you may not show in 5004, 5005, 5006, 5008, 5012, 5013, 5014, 5021, 5022, 5023, 5053, 5055, 5061, 5062, 5063 with the same horse. Speed Type Performance classes are offered for speed exhibitors who would like to participate in a discipline outside their comfort level and/or the ability of the horse.
18. If you show in open Pleasure Type Classes, you may not show in 5007, 5008, 5016, 5021, 5062, 50633 with the same horse.
19. Unless otherwise specified, current Michigan 4-H Horse & Pony Project Rules apply.

Novice Walk-Trot Classes

1. Exhibitors showing in Walk-Trot Novice Classes are not allowed to show in any three-gaited classes. They may show in Halter/Costume.
2. These classes are for Novice Riders, but a minimum level of skill is necessary. Riders should be able to ride independently and be capable of controlling their horse/pony.
3. Under Division 4, Gymkhana exhibitors showing in Novice Walk-Trot 19 & under may not show in any other Gymkhana classes. Helmets are required when mounted.

Sprout Classes, Ages 5-7, classes will be placed

1. Helmets are required when mounted.
2. Exhibitors showing in Sprout Classes are not allowed to show in any three-gaited classes.
3. A parent, guardian or adult must accompany a sprout exhibitor into the ring whether it is Sprout Lead Line or Sprout Walk-Trot. No show attire for parent or guardian.
4. Sprout age exhibitors may bring their own horse/pony to fair.

BARN RULES

1. Exhibitors are responsible for having the following information posted on their stall:

2. Horses must stay in the designated area.
 3. Horses must be led between the arena and barn.
 4. Bedding is required in your horse's stall.
 5. Hay nets and hay bags must be tied above the horse's withers for safety.
 6. No smoking or vaping in or near barn.
 7. Aisles must be kept clear, clean, and tidy.
 8. Manure must be put in the designated area.
 9. **NO MANURE in GARBAGE CANS**
 10. Stalls cleaned daily before 9:00 AM
 11. Horses to be fed between 6:30 AM – 8:00 AM & 5:00 PM – 6:30 PM (unless exhibitor is showing in project area)
 12. **Fresh water in horse stall must be maintained at all times.**
 13. There will be a nightly check at 10:00 PM and at other random times. Superintendent and Fairboard will monitor proper care and maintenance of the animal and assigned housing.
 14. ALL horses must be in stalls by 10:00 PM
 15. ALL lights out in barn at 11:00 PM
 16. Exhibitors must always wear proper footwear in horse barns, arenas, and other horse areas while handling horses and while mounted.
 17. Any posted additional rules shall be followed.

Failure to comply with any of the rules, or lack of care of an exhibitors' animal, may result in the removal of the exhibitor privileges and or loss of exhibiting privileges for a maximum of two years at the Eastern Michigan State Fair.

GENERAL RULES: Also See Rules Governing Entries, Exhibitions and Awards, General Rules, and Rules for Livestock.

1. All Poultry must be owned by May 1st of the current year, except for birds used for meat pens, which must be owned within one week of hatching.
2. Each exhibitor may enter a maximum of FIVE pens of poultry with up to TWO of the FIVE pens being market birds. Market bird pens must be two separate species. May also be entered in the Home-grown class if parent birds are owned by the exhibitor at time of breeding.
3. Tag-in and pullorum testing will take place the first week of June. (Time and place to be announced)
4. All poultry must meet health requirements set forth by the Michigan Department of Agriculture Animal Industry Division. See Michigan Department of Agriculture Animal Industry Division Requirements for Livestock Exhibited in Michigan for specific details. No bird can be put in a cage until it has been tested for pullorum-typhoid and the test is negative, OR appropriate documents have been presented. An authorized tester will be available up to 45 days prior to the fair at the discretion of the superintendent and certified tester. Exhibitors or their representatives must be present and assist in handling of their birds during testing and check-in.
5. All poultry must be clean and parasite free. The Superintendent or designee will inspect each bird at check-in on Sunday. Approval must be given before the birds are put in their assigned cages. If parasites are detected, the exhibitor will have one opportunity to treat affected bird(s). Upon second inspection by the Superintendent, if live parasites are still present the exhibitor will not be allowed to exhibit the affected bird(s). Check in Sunday Pre-Fair 8-11 am
6. All poultry and eggs must be in cages by 3:00 pm Sunday, pre-fair.
7. Birds must be fed and watered daily by 10:00 am (8:00 am on show day.) Exhibitors will provide clean and like new feed and water containers appropriate for their poultry according to breed and size. Containers must be fastened to the front of the cage to prevent spilling.
8. All exhibitors must clean their floor pens and cages, and areas under cages must be swept out by 10:00 am daily (8:00 am on show day). ALL bedding must be completely replaced on auction day, Thursday, by 8 am and as needed at the superintendent's request.
9. At the time of animal release, Sunday a.m. post-fair, all poultry must be removed from cages by 10:00 am. Cages must be cleaned and taken down. Area under cages must be completely cleaned. All wood shavings and manure must be put in the proper place. Superintendent must inspect cages and area under cages before release is approved. Exhibitors not complying with this rule will have \$20.00 per cage deducted from their livestock sale check.
10. All native game birds shown must have proper permits.
11. Failure to comply with any of the rules, or lack of care of a member's animal, may result in removal of the exhibit and forfeiture of sale privileges and/or exhibiting privileges for not more than 2 years at the Eastern Michigan State Fair.
12. Pen sheets must be filled out at time registration.
13. Barn duty is required by every exhibitor to share equally. Time slot sign up will be determined once the number of exhibitors is known.

MARKET POULTRY RULES

1. Each pen of meat class birds must be market age, generally 6 months or younger, and of the same sex and variety. Exhibitors will provide hatch date and NPIP information to the superintendent at check-in on Sunday.
2. All meat pens will be weighed at time of check in. No more than 6 birds per exhibitor will be weighed. Exhibitors or their representatives must be present to handle birds during weigh-in and decide which 3 birds will be in their meat pen.
3. Meat pens will be sold in the livestock auction. Seller is responsible to take birds to processor, pay processing fee, pick poultry up from processor & deliver poultry to buyer, unless buyer has requested otherwise.
4. All exhibitors showing a poultry meat pen must show in poultry showmanship, in order to sell.
5. A game bird meat pen consists of one of the following species: quail, partridge, guinea, or pheasant.
6. It is recommended chickens be 6 to 10 weeks of age and 5 to 10 lbs. Ducks are recommended to be 20 weeks of age with a minimum weight of 4 lbs. and Turkeys be 20-24 weeks of age with a minimum weight of 15 lbs. per bird.
7. The recommended weight difference between the lightest and the heaviest bird in the pen should not be more than 4 oz. for quail, 2 pounds for turkeys, and 1 pound for all other meat pens.

6. Swine will be checked into the fairgrounds on the first Sunday of fair from 7-9 a.m. **Swine will be weighed on Monday of fair from 7-9am.** Any animal not presented for weigh-in on Monday, by the member or representative, must be immediately removed from the grounds by the member. Swine will NOT be reweighed.
7. Youth member or representative must be present at time of unloading, weighing and initial care of animal.
8. Swine must be a minimum of 220 lbs. and a maximum of 300 lbs. at fair to be eligible to sell in the auction.
9. Exhibitor may sell an overweight hog at 300 lbs. provided the member does not have another hog within market weight.
10. Swine over maximum market weight are not eligible to show in championship drive.

1. Departments: Horse, Beef Cattle, Dairy Cattle, Sheep, Swine, Goats (per Goats, Rule #11), Rabbits, Poultry and Dogs will compete in Sweepstakes Showmanship. The contest will be open to the Supreme Showman winner in each department if the winner has attained the age of 15 as of January 1. If the Supreme Showman is not 15, the advanced senior showmanship winner in that department will compete.
2. If an exhibitor wins in multiple areas, it is the exhibitor's choice as to which species he/she will show. The exhibitor must declare the species he/she will show by Wednesday by 8:00 pm to the species and sweepstakes superintendents.
3. Each showman will show all species in round robin format with each exhibitor showing his/her animal during the final round of competition. Prior to the final round, each exhibitor will have five (5) minutes to allow for the exhibitor to fit their animal.
4. In the interest of good sportsmanship, each exhibitor must assist fellow exhibitors in learning the showmanship of their particular species.
5. Each contestant will be judged on his/her ability to handle and present that animal to its breed standard. The contestants will be judged on their appearance, questions and ability to follow the judge's instructions.
6. Each contestant will be ranked 1st through 9th on each species by the judge.
7. The final placing will be based on total points with 1st place getting 1 point, 2nd getting 2 points, etc. contestant with lowest total points will prevail.
8. Ties will be broken as follows: Individual with the most 1st places will prevail; if a tie still exists, the individual with the most 2nd places will prevail and so forth.
9. All judges will be at least 20 years of age and will in no way be related to contestants in the contest. Judges will be current judges if available, or judges from surrounding counties.
10. Judges will be hired by the sweepstakes showmanship superintendents three months prior to the fair. Judges will receive a uniform packet of information including score sheets and expectations.
11. All sweepstakes participants must meet in the Walker Barn at 6:00 pm on Friday night of the fair.
12. If a contestant is not present at the time of show or is disqualified, a suitable replacement animal will be picked by the sweepstakes superintendent and species superintendent, so that all species will be represented and judged.
